What is Knowledge Translation?

Knowledge translation (KT) is the process by which new knowledge is translated into information that benefits society, through changed policies, behaviors, programs and practices. KT is more than the simple dissemination of

knowledge; it is the application of knowledge to solve societal problems. In the health care arena, KT refers to the process of translating new research findings into improvements in treatment, patient care, health services

delivery, and health care policy and programs.

Model System Knowledge Translation Center

As part of National Institute on Disability and Rehabilitation Research (NIDRR) funding, the University of Washington has formed the Model Systems Knowledge Translation Center (MSKTC). Dr. Kurt Johnson leads a team of individuals who work to summarize research, identify health information needs and develop systems for sharing information for the NIDRR model systems programs in traumatic brain, spinal cord, and burn injury.

Research Update

The Model System Knowledge Translation Center (MSKTC) at the University of Washington has developed a survey to learn about the information needs of individuals with burn injuries.
