New Delirium Factsheet Available

This year the Model Systems Knowledge Translation Center (MSKTC) released a new factsheet about delirium after burn injury. Delirium is defined as a 'disturbance in mental abilities that causes confused thinking and reduced awareness of one's environment.' Symptoms include:

- Reduced awareness of the environment
- Poor thinking skills
- Changes in behavior
- Emotional disturbances or changes

Burn Nursing Recognized as a Nursing Specialty

This past August, the American Nurses Association (ANA) recognized burn nursing as a nursing specialty. This recognition comes following the submission of a new resource, *Burn Nursing: Scope and Standards of Practice* that details burn nursing and references the NIDILRR-funded Burn Model System (BMS) National Database (NDB). In response, Dr. Cate Miller, NIDILRR Rehabilitation Program Specialist, stated "The side-by-side reference of the BMS NDB with the American Burn Association National Burn Repository as two of the largest burn injury databases is not only a truth, but an important acknowledgement of the value of the BMS NDB for the field. The description of the NDB nicely highlights the unique role that the BMS NDB serves... understanding long-term outcomes of persons with burn injury."
