The North Whatcom Fire and Rescue Board of Fire Commissioners recently appointed Kimberly Calman-McMurray to Commissioner position #5. As a high school senior Kimberly was burned over 65% of her body. After a 95-day hospitalization at Harborview Medical Center, she was able to return to school and graduate with her class. Kimberly earned a Bachelors degree in business administration at Northwest Nazarene University and has remained active in the burn community. 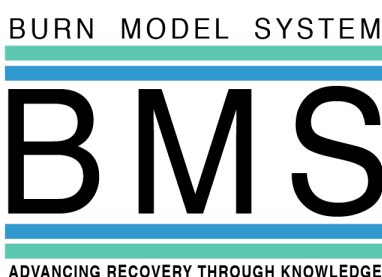
Familiar Face Joins the Research Team
